Dear Supporters and Friends,

2024 was a year when the ground shifted beneath people's feet, yet they stood taller. Across Afghanistan and the Middle East, the individuals we work with kept creating meaning in places designed to suppress it.

Underground teachers kept classrooms alive behind blackout curtains.

Translators carried compelling and important ideas about freedom across languages. Entrepreneurs opened shops and studios even as power cuts, checkpoints, and collapsing economies made daily life feel heavier.

And still, people continued, not because conditions improved, but because stopping would have meant surrendering the future.

In Afghanistan, forty underground schools taught nearly four thousand girls in ten provinces. In living rooms and basements, teachers who had lost their public school jobs rebuilt classrooms with donated books and laptops paid through digital wallets and Bitcoin. When the world looked away, they kept going.

Our House of Wisdom 2.0 team translated almost two million words into Arabic, Kurdish, Farsi/Dari, and Pashto, launched a new bilingual website, and reached more than one hundred million readers and viewers. Some of our translators wrote essays about what translation means to them, not as a job but as a form of intellectual

courage, and a way to expand what their societies believe is possible.

The Innovation Hub funded eighty-three entrepreneurs who turned modest grants into nearly one million dollars in revenue. From a women-led media start-up in Herat to an olive-waste clean energy project in Beirut to design studios and bookstores in Baghdad and Erbil, the region's often overlooked revolutionaries showed how dignity is contagious when people have the tools to sow it.

This year, their courage was recognized. An Afghan teacher operating a network of secret classrooms received the Axel Springer Foundation Award for Courage. I was honored to speak about her work, and the work of so many like her, at the German Parliament, at TEDNext in Atlanta, at the Oslo Freedom Forum, and at the Copenhagen Democracy Summit.

2024 was a milestone year for Ideas Beyond Borders. We are becoming a trusted and sought-after organization for those who want credible, practical, locally rooted solutions in the Middle East and in the West. Policymakers, donors, and institutions now look to



IBB not only to understand what is happening on the ground—but to understand what works in practice. What was once aspirational for IBB is now all the more possible.

In the year ahead, expect to see more of us. We will be present in parliaments and conferences, in universities and community centers, and in private roundtables and public debates. Our presence is growing because the demand for real, tested solutions is increasing.

Through it all, our guiding north star remains unchanged: to keep knowledge alive, expand economic opportunity, and empower people to build freer, more informed societies from the ground up.

To everyone who has stood with us—our partners, sponsors, and friends, thank you. You have helped keep classrooms open, books translated, businesses growing, and hope alive in places determined to extinguish it.

House of Wisdom 2.0: Expanding Access to Knowledge

IBB's Bayt al-Hikma 2.0 (House of Wisdom 2.0) continued to grow as the largest Arabic-language knowledge platform of its kind.

It translated and produced content that brought critical thinking, science, and history to millions of readers and viewers — in Arabic, Kurdish, Farsi/Dari, and Pashto.

Partnerships and Reach



IBB partnered with the American University of Kurdistan (AUK) to launch the first Wikipedia Club in Iraq that publishes articles in Kurdish and English.

The club began with a group of students from different majors who translated and wrote articles on Kurdish culture, literature, and history, guided by IBB training materials and mentors from Bayt al-Hikma 2.0. Within its first semester, members had already published dozens of new articles, helping expand Kurdish-language content and digital literacy on campus.

Bayt al-Hikma's reach now overlaps with IBB's education and entrepreneurship programs: its translated materials are used by Afghan teachers in underground schools, Objectivist study groups, and Bitcoin literacy initiatives alike — proof that knowledge travels farthest when it's shared freely.

Voices Behind the Words: Our Translators' Stories

Translation sits at the center of Ideas Beyond Borders's work.

Every article, book, and video starts with a deliberate choice to carry an idea across a language barrier—sometimes in places where that choice can put people at risk. In 2024, several IBB translators wrote about their experiences for the House of Wisdom 2.0 blog. Their essays show how translation can change what people know, what they question, and what conversations become possible.



From Isolation to Enlightenment

Alissar Obaid

Growing up in a conservative community in Syria, [Alissar Obaid described](#) how IBB opened new doors for her and her readers.

“We lived surrounded by invisible walls. We were cut off from other ways of thinking, and even from curiosity itself. Knowing too much could make you question the customs and traditions that everyone around you accepted without thought.”

Through translation, Alissar challenged those walls, first by sharing science and history, then by encouraging dialogue.

Her work changed more than just her own outlook: even her mother and friends began rethinking long-held assumptions about women's rights and LGBT issues.



Smuggled Wisdom

Habib Zreik


Habib Zreik's story begins in his father's hidden library, where banned books like *The Iliad*, *The Bible*, and *The Ginza Rabba* were smuggled between Saudi Arabia and Syria. Reading them became his first act of rebellion.

“When I was in elementary school, a friend once reported me to the teacher for mentioning a banned religious sect. From that day, I learned that some ideas are dangerous to even talk about. I began to dream of living somewhere I could read and debate freely.”

Today, Habib translates some of the same ideas he once had to hide. His work with IBB has brought Arabic editions of *Freedom of Speech* by Jacob Mchangama, *Palestine 1936* by Oren Kessler, and *Foundational Falsehoods of Creationism* by Aron Ra to thousands of readers.



Rami Abdo Zarad studied English literature at Damascus University and joined Bayt al-Hikma 2.0 to close the gap between those who have access to information and those who do not. “Any seeker of unfiltered information has always needed two things: English proficiency and internet access,” he wrote in his article *Words in Motion*. “Through translation, we can remove both barriers.” For him, every new article starts a chain reaction, each reader inspiring another to learn.



In *Literary Liberation*, Hazem Mousa traces the decline of serious translation in the Arabic world and the flood of sensational or politicized works that replaced it. Joining IBB reminded him of the original House of Wisdom's purpose—to make knowledge public. “*For the first time, I felt I was witnessing a genuine attempt at an Arabic renaissance in the making,*” he wrote, describing the team’s efforts to bring modern philosophy and science into Arabic and Kurdish.



A New Digital Home for House of Wisdom 2.0



Inspired by Baghdad's original House of Wisdom, the platform continues the legacy of a historic center of learning by offering diverse formats of high-quality, accessible knowledge.

The new site brings this mission to life through an expanded digital library, videos, articles, podcasts, and translated works—all now available in Arabic and AI-translated English. More intuitive, more dynamic, and more comprehensive than ever, the platform embodies our commitment to reviving a spirit of curiosity, innovation, and exchange—reimagined for the digital era.

Underground Schools in Afghanistan

When the Taliban banned girls from secondary education, many teachers went underground. IBB helped them continue teaching.

In 2024, IBB supported 40 covert classrooms across 10 provinces of Afghanistan, teaching **3,750 students** in subjects ranging from math and English to physics, biology, and tailoring. These lessons took place in living rooms, basements, and backyards — anywhere a curtain could serve as a wall.

- ✓ **3,750 students and 40 teachers** employed, most of them women who had lost their public-school jobs.
- ✓ **13 core subjects** taught, including literacy, art, and health awareness.
- ✓ IBB provided **books, laptops, and teaching stipends** — often delivered through digital wallets or Bitcoin transfers to ensure security.



Teaching Afghan girls English is vital because it gives them access to global knowledge and opportunities for remote employment in the future.



Women are training in 200+ tailoring shops opened by our graduates. It's a way for them to earn money without drawing too much attention.

Many of these teachers now also mentor students who have since opened their own small schools. IBB has added weekly reading circles, health sessions, and counseling to help girls cope with trauma and prepare for online higher education.

The Underground Schools program was also selected by **The Citizenry** as its annual Black Friday Fund recipient, contributing \$30,000 to ensure continued access to education for women and girls across Afghanistan. This support will allow IBB to expand psychological counseling, health education, and literacy programs within the schools in 2025.

Innovation Hub: When Ideas Become Practical Solutions

The Innovation Hub is the point where House of Wisdom 2.0's ideas leave the page and land in workshops, kitchens, farms, and classrooms.

Instead of staying theoretical, they become small, workable projects—run by people who know their communities best. Through modest, targeted grants, the program helps individuals turn their own ideas into businesses that support families, create jobs, and strengthen local life.

Across Afghanistan, Iraq, Kurdistan, and Lebanon, the Innovation Hub's 2024 grantees turned small injections of support into real livelihoods. The projects range from bookshops and kitchens to farms, workshops, and classrooms—each one a local expression of knowledge put to work.



Afghanistan: Ideas Put to Work Under Taliban Rule

To Build a Kitchen

A fund from Ideas Beyond Borders is helping one young woman create a future for her family while living under Taliban rule

In Kabul, **Zahra**, a 22-year-old doctor, found herself the sole provider for her family after her brother fled the country. **A \$3,500 grant helped her and her father launch a small catering business, one of the few sectors women can still navigate.** Zahra now manages operations, hires staff, and uses her network of patients to bring in clients, proof that even under the Taliban, women can drive family income.

In Herat, Azita Nazhand, 25, refused to let Afghanistan's last women-run TV station go dark. With a \$4,000 grant, she re-launched her channel as Rasa Zan (“Woman” in Persian), airing programs that spotlight women's education and civic life.

Also in Herat, 17-year-old **Osmani built a mind-controlled wheelchair** that later won Best Idea at Teknofest Istanbul after IBB's \$2,000 seed grant.

“It was a big achievement for me,” he said. “The grant turned an idea into reality.”

Nineteen-year-old **Shahin Soliman Khil used a \$3,000 grant to open Café Book Timeout, where young Afghans meet to discuss philosophy and poetry.**

Kurdistan and Iraq: Local Knowledge Driving New Solutions

In Baghdad, Mohammed Abdulimam transformed personal tragedy into a mission for social change after losing his best friend in a bombing. He launched **Taatuf**, a t-shirt line featuring messages like “Words are windows, not walls.” With a \$3,000 grant, he doubled production and led youth campaigns championing empathy and coexistence.

In Erbil, The Lotus Flower is empowering women inside the region's largest refugee camps. A \$5,000 Innovation Hub grant helped launch the Women's Business Incubation Program, offering financial support to home-based female entrepreneurs in the Essyan Camp. One participant, **Amina Khalaf Hamed**, a 28-year-old seamstress from Sharya, had sold her sewing tools to fund her mother's cancer treatment and struggled to support her family. With assistance from the program, she repurchased her equipment, revived her business, and now plans to mentor and employ young women in her community. According to regional director **Vian Ahmed**, the initiative not only fuels economic independence but also strengthens family well-being, even helping reduce domestic violence by boosting women's financial stability.

In Sulaymaniyah, **Liza Al-Bag** is preserving heritage through innovation. Her work revives ancient Kurdish Deq tattoo motifs by weaving them into contemporary rugs. A \$3,000 grant funded new wool-processing tools and training opportunities for rural women.

Lebanon: Practical Innovation in a Time of Strain

In Beirut, Lana Halabi used a \$4,000 IBB grant to bring her grandfather's old Halabi Bookshop back to life. The shop first opened in 1958, then sat locked for years. She cleared out the dust, added new shelving in the back, and built a small online store so she could ship books to readers abroad. “We get messages from the diaspora saying how proud they feel,” she said. What began as an effort to save a family space has turned into a small literary hangout for the community.

Olive farming in times of war

Amid rising tensions, Samer Hasbany is forced to find new ways to maintain his family olive business in southern Lebanon

South of the city, Samer Hasbany was watching his family's olive farm struggle. Conflict made everything harder, and piles of wasted olive pulp kept building up after each harvest.

With a \$2,000 grant, he started **Olive Log** — a workshop where he presses that pulp into fuel briquettes. Local restaurants now buy them for their stoves, and a few neighbors earn seasonal income helping with production. It's a practical idea that cut down on waste and kept the farm afloat.

In Tripoli, IBB backed Gudtolli, a fresh-pasta shop run by Leila Khalife. Her team switched part of their operation to solar power, hired local women, and began planning live pasta stations for markets and events. **The business has become a reliable employer in a city where jobs come and go.**



The Untold Stories of the Middle East

In 2024, Ideas Beyond Borders published *The Untold Stories of the Middle East*, a book that brings together firsthand accounts from people building something new in Iraq, Kurdistan, Lebanon, and Afghanistan.



Reported by our field team and written by Olivia Cuthbert, it follows Innovation Hub grantees whose work rarely makes headlines: women in Kabul learning trades they can practice from home, engineers in Erbil shaping prosthetic limbs on a 3D printer, young people in Karbala carving out space for free expression, and Yazidi families in Sinjar piecing their cultural life back together.

The book pairs these accounts with field photographs, original illustrations, and careful visual design that make each place and project feel close at hand. Together, they show how people in the region push forward

Objectivist Center of Iraq: Rational Thought and Enterprise

Funded by the Prometheus Foundation and hosted by the University of Kurdistan-Hawler (UKH), IBB's pilot for the **Objectivist Center of Iraq** introduced university students to Ayn Rand's philosophy and its link to entrepreneurship.

Participants created micro-projects grounded in Objectivist principles — from leadership training and business innovation to rational debate circles — proving that philosophy can drive real-world action. Many went on to launch debate clubs and campus initiatives inspired by these ideas, turning abstract principles into tangible change. The pilot's success has already raised interest from additional universities to host the program in 2025, marking the start of a movement toward rational and entrepreneurial education.



Workshops helped Iraqi students explore Objectivist ideas, the importance of entrepreneurship and individual liberty.



After the workshops participants showed increased confidence in applying rational thinking and balancing personal and professional goals.

- ✓ **Six workshops** held across eight universities.
- ✓ **21 participants**, representing **9 institutions** including **UKH, Mosul University, AUK, Tishk University, and AUIS**.
- ✓ Post-program assessments showed **strong gains in understanding Objectivist philosophy** and self-interest as a moral principle.

Youth Media Program for Minorities in Iraq

Ideas Beyond Borders launched a one-year Youth Media Program to elevate the voices of Iraq's minority communities.

In partnership with the Kurdistan Information Network (KIN) and the Wikimedia Foundation, IBB trained 26 young reporters from 13 minority groups to document their heritage and daily lives through film, raising awareness of minority issues and promoting tolerance.

Participants produced **13 documentaries** and multilingual Wikipedia articles, reaching

more than **13.4 million views** (four times the target). Films covered Yazidi, Shabak, Kaka'i, Fayli, Christian (Assyrians, Armenians), Roma, Zoroastrian, Sabean-Mandean, Baha'i, Jews, Turkmen, and Bidoon communities.

The first English-language episode is set to premiere at a public screening in February 2025 at New York University (NYU).



This initiative set a precedent for inclusive storytelling in Iraq, combining professional journalism training with digital media advocacy.



Broadcast on Zagros TV

Eleven of the program's documentaries were broadcast on **Zagros TV**, one of the Kurdistan Region's largest satellite channels with nationwide reach. The broadcasts gave unprecedented visibility to Iraq's minority communities, bringing their stories to millions of households and validating the work of the young reporters.

Kurdistan is Open for Business: A Path to Prosperity for Startups

Funded by Atlas Network's [Smart Bets](#) initiative and implemented with Rwanga Foundation, ECHO, and key Kurdistan Regional Government (KRG) ministries, this project makes it faster and easier for young entrepreneurs to register and grow their businesses.

2024 Achievements

- ✓ Launched a pilot of the region's first fully integrated online business registration portal, aiming to **reduce registration time from three months to just 24 hours.**
- ✓ **Drew 998 startup applications in the first week**, with 30 pilot businesses selected to refine and improve the platform.
- ✓ **Activated early reform dialogue with top government institutions**, including the KRG Ministry of Trade and Industry, the Board of Investment, and leading chambers of commerce.

✓ **Implemented a landmark research and advocacy initiative** identifying the legal and administrative barriers hindering business creation.

✓ **Produced decisive findings:**

- **95%** of entrepreneurs cannot access loans.
- **84%** cite outdated tax laws.
- **87%** report limited access to training and startup support.



With support from the Human Rights Foundation, IBB's Building Bridges to Bitcoin initiative will educate millions on digital finance and personal autonomy.

By providing educational material in Arabic, the project will empower local youth to combat tyranny with Bitcoin, secure their financial autonomy, protect their human rights, and transform their region. Funding will support:

- ✓ The production of **educational videos** and **articles** translated to Arabic and Pashto.
- ✓ Aim to reach over **10 million views** across platforms.
- ✓ Use Bitcoin and stablecoins to pay teachers in underground schools safely, bypassing Taliban-controlled system and allowing **3,750 girls** to continue their studies.



Global Engagement

Public Speaking and Thought Leadership



In 2024, Ideas Beyond Borders carried its work far beyond classrooms and studios. IBB's founder, Faisal Saeed Al Mutar, spoke around the world about rebuilding societies from the ground up — from the [Oslo Freedom Forum](#) to [TEDNext](#) in Atlanta, where his talk, "[A Fresh Approach to International Development](#)," drew global attention to IBB's locally-led model.

He also spoke at the Copenhagen Democracy Summit, the Bitcoin MENA Forum, the Global Free Speech Summit at Vanderbilt University, and [addressed students](#) in Guatemala at the College Freedom Forum hosted by Universidad Francisco Marroquín, discussing how entrepreneurship and access to information can create stability in post-conflict regions.

In October 2024, Faisal addressed the **German Parliament** (Bundestag), outlining how local entrepreneurship and access to knowledge can counter extremism. His remarks prompted cross-party interest and ongoing discussions with German policy-makers and foundations.


That same year, Faisal received an Honorary Doctorate from Whittier College, a Fellowship at George Washington University, and the Ellis Island Beacon Award. IBB retained its UN Special Consultative Status and top transparency ratings from Candid (Platinum) and Charity Navigator (4-star).

IBB also launched a [new website](#) to house its programs and impact stories in one place. Within its first months online, the

site withstood more than **136,000 malicious attacks** — a sign of both resilience and growing influence in regions where its work challenges authoritarian control over information.


IBB's reach expanded through partnerships with the Human Rights Foundation, Rwanda Foundation, Atlas Network, Prometheus Foundation, and Kurdistan Information Network.

Its programs were featured in *Forbes*, *Reason Magazine*, and *FastCompany*, and its first book, *The Untold Stories of the Middle East*, captured the voices of teachers, students, and entrepreneurs whose journeys were supported by IBB.



Axel Springer Foundation Award for Courage

In November 2024, an Afghan teacher supported by Ideas Beyond Borders received the Axel Springer Foundation Award for Courage.



She was honored for operating a network of secret classrooms for girls in Afghanistan — part of the IBB-backed underground education system that continues to function despite Taliban restrictions. The teacher accepted the award anonymously for her safety.

The Axel Springer Foundation described her as “a heroine who defies a regime determined to erase women from public life.”

IBB has worked quietly with her and dozens of other Afghan educators since 2021, supplying lesson materials, digital devices, and secure payments that make these schools possible.

The recognition brought global attention to Afghanistan’s underground education movement and drew new partners into supporting women-led learning initiatives.


